Film Review *'Let Them All Talk'*

How does one begin to *talk* about this film? Initially so frustrating with its seemingly superficial, unforgiving and bitchy characters, once close college friends, unearthed from the past and reunited on the luxurious Queen Mary II as it sails from America to the United Kingdom. Why has the successful novelist Alice chosen these old friends to accompany her on a voyage that could be her last?

It reminded me of Woody Allen's films with its obscure narrative of emotionally crippled and neurotic characters, but it is much more than that. As in life, the film reveals the power and significance of storytelling and the impact it can have on our lives. At times, I could have been forgiven for thinking Steven Soderbergh was gently satirising Allen's films but all is revealed in the closing stages of the film, and it's well worth the wait. Persevere and watch it to the end, you won't be disappointed.


